Dear Brothers and Sisters,

In my previous article on considering how our Catholic faith in the Real Presence of Christ in the Eucharist developed and spread so quickly in the early Church and how Jews of the first century enthusiastically converted in Pitre's book, Jesus and the Jewish Roots of the Eucharist, I focused on the Passover. If you remember, Pitre explains that the Jewish faith laid the foundation of their and our Catholic faith in the Real Presence, body, blood, soul, and divinity. The three elements in the Jewish faith Pitre describes are: the Passover, the Manna from Heaven, and the Bread of Presence kept in the Temple Tabernacle. I want to focus the attention of this article on the second critical element, Jesus, as the Manna from Heaven.

The Manna God gave to Israel daily in the wilderness came in the form of bread in the morning and the flesh of quail in the evening. The people of Israel, led by Moses, ate the Bread of Angels that tasted of milk and honey as a foretaste of the Promised Land. The leftover Manna that rained down from heaven would be collected and placed in the Golden Urn as a sign of God's love for his people. The Golden Urn was then veiled and placed in the Tabernacle, as it was sacred and holy and veiled in mystery, sounding familiar to our Catholic tradition today. Jewish belief expected that the Messiah come again and bring back the Manna from heaven. This expectation is expressed in the Jewish apocryphal work of 2 Baruch, not found in our scripture. Early Christians made the connection to Jesus and the Eucharist after the Resurrection.

In Matthew 6, when the disciples ask how to pray, Jesus gave us the gift of the Lord's Prayer. The unique word translated for "daily" bread occurs only once in the bible, and early Christians quickly noticed. Jesus purposefully chose his words of how we pray to the Father. It is derived from the Greek epi-ousios. Without getting into the weeds of the Greek root words here, St. Jerome translated it as, "Give us this day our supersubstantial bread." Delving into the Catechism of the Church (CCC 2837), taken literally, epi-ousios translates as "super-essential." Another word we could use is supernatural, if that helps. Jesus is referring to the Manna necessary to sustain and obtain eternal life. Without it, there can be no life in us. It is another foretaste of the Eucharist and refers directly to the Bread of Life, the Body of Christ. Jesus is referring to Himself. Jesus is the New Manna, and he tells us while teaching in the synagogue in Capernaum (John 6), "I am the bread of life. Your fathers ate the Manna in the wilderness, and they died. This is the bread come down from heaven that man might eat of it and not die. I am the living bread which came down from heaven. Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood has eternal life, and I will raise him on the last day. For my flesh is true food, and my blood is true drink. Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood remains in me, and I in him...This is the bread that came down from heaven. Unlike your ancestors who ate and still died, whoever eats this bread will live

The teaching was challenging and horrific to understand at the time and even the Apostles struggled with what Jesus might mean, but they trusted in our Lord. Many of his disciples abandoned him. The mystery came to light after the Resurrection. The Early Church understood Jesus meant his risen body and blood and began to celebrate the sacrifice of the Eucharist. They never wanted to be separated from Christ and his gift of Himself and gave their lives for it.

In the last article in this forthcoming series, I will discuss Pitre's final element in Our Jewish Roots of the Eucharist, the Bread of Presence kept in the Temple Tabernacle. As I said before if there is interest, perhaps a bible study could further develop this profound truth of our Catholic faith.


