Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

This Wednesday, December 6 was the feast day of the great St. Nicholas, sometimes known as St. Nicholas of Myra or less frequently as St. Nicholas of Bari. He is of course the basis for our modern day fictional legend of Santa Claus (Sinterklaas in Dutch). However, I find the story of the *real* Nicholas much more interesting than any story of a fat man in red squeezing up and down chimneys all night on Christmas Eve!

According to tradition, Nicholas was born in the year 270 AD to wealthy Greek Christian parents in modern day Turkey. He was a devoutly religious child, and when still quite young his parents died suddenly in an epidemic. He was then taken into the care of an uncle, also named Nicholas, who was a bishop, and was further educated in the Faith. He was eventually ordained a priest by his uncle and after a lengthy pilgrimage in the Holy Land, returned to Turkey and was for a time thrown into prison during the reign of the Roman Emperor Diocletian. He was probably greatly mistreated there, as analysis of his relics in Bari, Italy revealed that he at least had suffered broken and rehealed facial bones and some other old injuries.

After Christianity was legalized in 312, he returned to the city of Myra in Turkey and was consecrated the bishop there around 317. He was a presiding bishop at the Council of Nicea in 325, which deliberated over the Arian heresy and formulated the Nicene Creed. Arius taught that Jesus was not divine but was created by the Father. Nicholas was a very public and vocal defender of Jesus' divinity. My favorite story about him is that during the council when Arius was presenting his ideas, Nicholas got so angry and fed up with what he was hearing that he simply got up and struck Arius in the face. He was thrown into prison overnight for doing this in the presence of the Emperor (poor court manners), but was released the next day.

Numerous stories of great miracles worked by him during life abound, but the most well-known is his custom of giving money and assistance to the poor. Most famously, he tossed through the window of a poor man's home three sums of gold in bags. The man had no money for dowries for his three daughters, and without this, they would never be able to marry and would have to resort to prostitution. Nicholas saved them from this abysmal fate. It is no doubt from this event in the life of St. Nicholas that the age-old custom of exchanging gifts on his feast day originated (and is really older than the custom of exchanging gifts on Christmas).

After a long life as a courageous, steadfast, and loving bishop, he died in Myra in the year 343 on December 6th, the date of the celebration of his feast. The real 'Santa Claus' was a remarkable man of faith and generosity. May we learn to emulate him in faith and selflessness! St. Nicholas of Myra, pray for us!!

Starting Saturday, January 6, 2024 Mass will be on Saturday evening at 5:30 pm with the Rosary starting around 5:00 pm.




