Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

I recently began reading a fascinating and alarming book by Dr. Paul Kengor, a professor of political science in Pennsylvania and a recent convert to Catholicism. The rather fetching title of the book is The Devil and Karl Marx. It is part biography of the man, as well as a tracing of the various religious and political movements that have sprung from his thought and writings. You might be wondering why I would write about something that would seem to be purely political. A fellow Catholic and social commentator can find the answer in a recent quote: "All politics is downstream of culture, and all culture is downstream of religion. Therefore all politics is fundamentally religious."

Marx was an avowed atheist, at least after his teenage years, though he was a baptized Christian and had a decent beginning as a child. His numerous writings, most famously The Communist Manifesto, unequivocally label all social and especially religious structures as his greatest enemies. This is because what he proposed was nothing less than to rewrite human nature so that a communist utopia could come forth, one without classes, money, inequality, or strife of any kind. To arrive there, however, would by his own admission require a bloody revolution. Indeed much of his writing and poetry and even discourse is rather dark, violent, and to any person of decent temper, evil. As it turns out, ideas can lead to reality. In the case of his ideas, totalitarian communist regimes of the last century are responsible for the deaths of 100 million people at minimum. The reality could easily be twice that figure.

This was no less true in his own tragic personal life. Marx and his wife Jenny lived and died in complete poverty and squalor. Only four of his eight children (7 with his wife and 1 with their maidservant) survived to adulthood. The other four died either in early childhood, all due to terrible living conditions, malnutrition, and neglect. Of these four, two died young due to disease and two daughters committed suicide and were childless. One might assume his ideas were an attempt at a solution to these problems, but the truth is even more tragic. It was really a direct result of his rage against God and his own selfishness. He steadfastly refused to work to support his family. Though he was often given large sums of money to support his family, they seldom saw any of it. He would instead consume it by spending it on alcohol, cigars, and selfish pursuits. If Marx did have a god, and it appeared to be himself and his own pleasures. He rejected all forms of morality and personal responsibility, especially Christian and Jewish morality, and it showed in his life and in the political structures that his ideas gave rise to.

Why do I bring all of this up? Because what we believe truly matters!! What we believe about God determines what we believe about human nature and dignity. This determines how we live and treat one another. Marx might have deceived himself into thinking that he was striving for just working conditions for laborers at the beginning of the Industrial Revolution. The results were far from that in practice, both in future communist regimes as well as in his own life. Many speak today of the 'culture war'. As I indicated at the beginning, the culture war has its roots in religious beliefs. The war is not for the culture, it is a war for the soul first. What we believe, how we act, the health of our immortal souls all affect our world and its health too. Keep the Faith! -Fr. Chris
