Have you ever considered how our Catholic faith in the Real Presence of Christ in the Eucharist developed and spread so quickly in the early Church? The early Christians, including the apostles, and St. Paul, who were devout Jews of the first century, enthusiastically converted and went from the prohibition and abomination detailed in Leviticus of drinking blood to the participation of eating and drinking the body and blood of Christ in the Eucharist. Dr. Brant Pitre describes in his book Jesus and the Jewish Roots of the Eucharist that it was precisely their Jewish faith that laid the foundation of their and our Catholic faith in the Real Presence, body, blood, soul, and divinity.

Looking at God's plan for our salvation through the lens of the Old Testament and Jewish tradition, Jesus manifested and fulfilled the Jewish hope and expectation of the Messiah. Pitre focuses on three critical elements in the Jewish faith: the Passover, the Manna from Heaven, and the Bread of Presence kept in the Temple Tabernacle. These three elements forge a path from the First Exodus led by Moses out of the slavery of Egypt to the Promised Land and the building of the Temple in Jerusalem, to Jesus the Messiah and New Exodus deliverer, who frees us from the slavery of sin and death, who is the New Temple and leads us to the New Jerusalem, and the salvation of a Heavenly Promised Land. I can only scratch the surface of the first element, The Passover, in this article for brevity. In the traditional Jewish Passover, the Jews focused on God's command of sacrificing an unblemished lamb to escape the Angel of Death that struck the firstborn of Egypt. The father of each household acted as the priest of his family and spread the lamb's blood on the house doorposts. Then, the family consumed the lamb. Eating the sacrificed lamb was not optional, as it was part of the command of the Lord, repeated every year by all Jews as before the exodus from Egypt as a meal of thanksgiving for all God had done for them.

The Passover of the Last Supper of Jesus differs in that while there is a meal, the lamb is not the focal point. The focal point of the Last Supper shifts to Jesus, who is to suffer and be put to death and becomes the New Lamb of Sacrifice, transforming the old Passover into a divine feast of redemption. Jesus offers his body and the pouring out of his blood for the forgiveness of sins with the sacrifice of unleavened bread and wine. He shares it with his twelve apostles, who represent the twelve tribes of Israel. The gift of the institution of the Eucharist celebrated then and now is a participation in the Passover of Jesus, the Eternal High Priest. As with the old Passover, eating the body and drinking the blood is not to be omitted but commanded to be consumed by Jesus, who gave his life so that we may have eternal life. It is not a symbolic meal. Early Christians realized the Mass made the paschal mystery everpresent every time it was celebrated. And it is still present. In the words of St. Paul, "Christ is our paschal lamb, has been sacrificed. Therefore let us keep the feast!"(1 Cor 5:7-8). Later articles, or a bible study, could further develop this profound truth of our Catholic faith.

Mission Speaker This Weekend

Marilyn Wassmer, from Mary Mother of God Mission Society will visit our parish **TODAY** to speak about the Roman Catholic Mission Churches in Eastern Russia. A second offering will be taken for the missions. In the early 1900's, the Russian Far East boasted a thriving Roman Catholic population. Many Russians, Poles, Lithuanians, and other groups inhabited the area and had built schools, hospitals, and beautiful churches. After the revolution of 1917, Russia became an emblem of the Communist era, a land without churches and without God. Under Stalin, all Catholic churches were confiscated and Dioceses closed. Most churches were desecrated or destroyed. Catholics were murdered by the hundreds of thousands and their bodies dumped into mass graves. Our two American priests, Fr. Myron Effing, CJD, and Fr. Daniel Maurer, CJD, arrived in Vladivostok in 1992 to help re-establish the Church in this region and provide charitable assistance to the many poor. Now that the foundations have been laid, additional priests and sisters are joining the work, and parishes are growing and multiplying, very slowly, but surely.
